By participating in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) and eliminating the need for meal applications, Fulton County Schools will reduce administrative and printing costs. Families also benefit from the elimination of completing and submitting meal applications.

Nondiscrimination Statement: This explains what to do if you believe you have been treated unfairly.

Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English.
